

JEWISH CHRISTIAN MUSLIM RELATIONS MINOR

Requirements

The minor consists of 20 credits. There are three required components:

- RTS 1100 "Christianity in Context" (offered every term);
- RTS 2950 "Ethics in the Abrahamic Traditions" (offered in the Fall term); and
- RTS 3760 "Theology & History of Jewish-Christian-Muslim Relations" (offered in the Spring term).

The remaining two courses are electives drawn from a broad range of relevant studies. They must focus on two different traditions. A list of approved courses is on the next page.

Finally, all minors engage with Jews, Christians, Muslims and others, in active interfaith work promoting social, political and economic justice.

Why Minor in Jewish-Christian-Muslim Relations?

Religious ignorance is a luxury no one can afford. Religion (like sex, money and power) is one of the great motivators of human behavior. People do amazing and horrific things all in the name of their god(s).

Those who minor in Jewish-Christian-Muslim relations study how these three great faiths have interacted over the centuries, not simply out of an interest in history, but also out of concern for our future.

One doesn't need to be religious to adopt this minor. Our minors include devout believers, curious seekers and confirmed atheists. What they share, is an interest in understanding the role that religions plays (both positive and negative) in society and culture, politics and economics and the arts.

There are at least three compelling reasons why every student at Merrimack ought to seriously consider this minor:

1. It's the right thing to do.

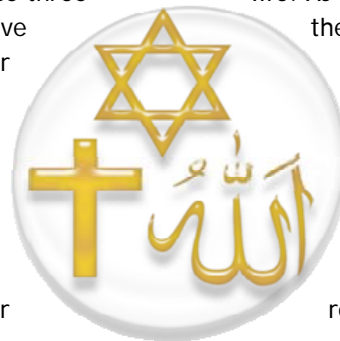
Religion continues to be one of the most promising, as well as most devastating, aspects of modern life. As the famous theologian Hans Küng once said, "There can be no peace in the world until there is peace among religions."

2. It's practical.

Diversity awareness and sensitivity continue to be a top priority among many employers and graduate schools. Whether you are considering a career in business, education, health care, engineering, law, law enforcement, community service, etc. you will encounter people of varied religious beliefs and cultures. Being liter-

ate in religious studies is crucial to your success, especially when one realizes that nearly two-thirds of the world's population is Christian or Muslim!

3. It's simple. Every student has to take eight credits in religious and theological studies. This minor requires only three additional courses, and most of them fulfill other distributional requirements.

- Networking across Merrimack College departments and with the local community;
- Actively responding to genocide and refugee emergencies.

Study-Travel Opportunities & Internships

There are two study-travel opportunities that satisfy the elective requirements for the minor:

SPA 3750 - *La Convivencia—Jews, Christians & Muslims in Medieval Spain*, which includes trips to Spain and Morocco. This is offered through the Department of Modern Languages and Culture.

RTS 3425 - *Augustine and Algeria*, study the history and dynamics of Christian-Muslim relations in Augustine's home country, modern day Algeria, includes a trip to Algeria in north Africa.
