# **Instructional Technology Vision**

Dear Colleagues,

After a semester of listening and engaging the Merrimack community, and following a visit to the Apple headquarters in California, I'm excited to set as one of my signature priorities as provost a commitment to create and further develop instructional technology on campus.

To support this goal, my office recently awarded <u>Provost Innovation Funds</u> to faculty-led teams seeking to employ technology to enhance teaching, learning, and scholarship.

In addition, representatives from Student and Academic Success, Residence Life, Communications and other campus services met with area innovation leaders to discuss plans to leverage mobility to enhance the student experience. I have also been thoroughly impressed with the level of faculty engagement and expertise in leveraging mobile technologies to enhance the educational experience for our students.

As a result of your work, Merrimack College is well-positioned to become an Apple Distinguished School in the next two years. The Office of the Provost remains committed to providing resources and supporting development with opportunities to work with Apple's Sue Burch as soon as this week.

### How can you help? As you vision your upcoming courses, please consider the following:

- Find accessible and alternative instructional materials/textbooks/apps to reduce cost and increase digital competency
- Purposefully include devices in the classroom
- Articulate guidelines in your syllabus
- Allow and encourage digital distribution of materials
- Consider adding to selected assignments (students can use varied tools on the iPad to do a creative project that demonstrates the competencies tested by assignment)
- Use one app in class to start. The camera is great to start with (photo, video, or even the new Clips app) = works with ANY DISCIPLINE
- Attend CETL professional development this May and/or August
- Engage the CETL for individualized development

Users will be able to run their own funding searches and/or request the assistance of Corporate and Foundation Development (CFD) and the Office for Sponsored Programs (OSP). The upgrade to our Blackboard environment has been completed! Blackboard is fully functional and SafeAssign is once again available.

Moving to a cloud platform allows for maintenance and fixes to be delivered faster, with no impact to faculty and students during system updates. You will also notice a new drag and drop feature to make creating modules and assignments easier for faculty, and submitting assignments easier for students! Through the new BbStudent app, students can now easily submit work from their Google Drive into Blackboard and participate in discussions right from their mobile device. In addition to these and other great new features, we are now in a position to begin exploring the new <a href="Ultra Experience">Ultra Experience</a>. We encourage you click through to the Ultra site and become familiar with where Blackboard is headed in the future.

# Summer Institutional Review Board (IRB) Status

#### Summer 2017 Reviews

Merrimack's Institutional Review Board (IRB) will be reviewing both exempt and expedited applications throughout the summer. We are working to establish two IRB meeting dates, one in mid-to late-June and another in late August to review any proposals we receive that will require a full review. The IRB will update the community through the *Provost Briefing* when the deadlines for applications and review dates are set.

### **New IRB Application and Review Software**

The Office of the Provost has invested in new online IRB application and review software that will improve and enhance the application and review process. More details on the new software and its use will be provided later in the summer and faculty/student training will be provided by the IRB during sessions in September. We hope to have the new software up and running by early July. During the transition to the new software, both the current application process and the new online process will be accepted.
