Important Blackboard Migration and Outage Reminder

Blackboard is being upgraded to deliver a better user experience for students and faculty. Working in conjunction with the Office of the Provost and the Registrar, the dates below present the least impact to our students with minimum interruption to their course work. Among other features, the new Blackboard platform will provide a more stable LMS environment campuswide and will allow for easy scalability during high usage and zero downtime during future updates.

To accomplish this upgrade, **Blackboard will be down beginning 12:00 AM, Monday, May 15th through 12:00 AM Monday, May 22nd**. To minimize any inconvenience, here are some key pre-outage preparation and dates to remember:

- May 8th Students will be enrolled into Bb SU2017 course shells
- May 11th Deadline for requests for Bb course copies and merges for SU2017 (Requests after this date will be completed when migration is complete)
- May 14th Deadline to complete grading and download Grade Center to spreadsheet Watch the instructional video here.

The institute has been developed to assist novice to experienced proposal writers in drafting complete proposals for submission.
