Course Description

Service learning is a two-semester requirement for all students in the Merrimack College Honors Program. At the broadest level, the requirement serves both the Program's and the College's core Augustinian values. The motivating vision is of experiential learning and service dedicated to the common good that challenges students to see their world differently. Ideally, service learning will be transformative.

Students normally in their sophomore year provide approximately two hours of individual on-site service each week. Service sites will be chosen in consultation with the Stevens Service Learning Center of Merrimack College. Whenever possible, the student will serve at same site for both semesters. Student preferences for the type and location of service will be honored whenever possible. Because service that connects to the student's own learning goals has the potential to be highly transformative, students are encouraged to seek service settings that draw on their particular interests and that can develop skills they are acquiring as part of their college education. Service provided through other Merrimack courses and programs (including Alternative Spring Break) does NOT count toward the satisfaction of the Honors Program service learning requirement.

To be truly transformative, a student's service experience must be accompanied by active reflection on what the student is engaged in. So to turn service into service learning, students will enroll in Reflecting on Service, a two-semester course sequence coinciding with the time of their service, HON2001H in the fall semester and its continuation HON2002H in the spring. The purpose of HON2001-2002 is to provide an opportunity for individual and group reflection on a student's service at the time that the service is being provided. The seminar will meet about six times each semester, and will consist of a variety of individual and group activities, including written reflections and oral discussion. Guest speakers and facilitators will also be invited.

Attendance is mandatory. A student who misses a class meeting must complete the online substitute material. There will be no required textbooks, graded papers, or exams, though students will be asked to complete short readings and ungraded writing projects. The successful completion of a student's service and of HON2001-HON2002 will count as one honors course. One credit each semester.
