Merrimack Recycles!

Merrimack College has entered into a new phase of recycling on campus. Starting last week, all academic and administrative buildings are being equipped with single-stream, zero-sort recycling bins located throughout each building. Single stream and zero-sort means that cardboard, paper, plastic, metal and glass can all be placed in a single bin. This expanded recycling initiative is being made possible by institutional support through the Office of the Provost, our contracts with Casella and Zampell, as well as generous funding from the McLaughlin Martin Family Environmental Innovation Fund. CETL Teaching Circles: Call for Proposals

The Office of the Provost is pleased to support the CETL Teachings Circles program, the goal of which is to improve teaching and learning at Merrimack as well as promote community among faculty. A teaching circle is a group of 5-8 faculty members who will work closely together for two semesters to focus on an issue related to improving teaching and learning. The circle is composed of faculty from across departments and is self-directed within the general structure of the teaching circles program.

The collegial nature of the circle is intended to foster openness, mutual support, and innovation. Teaching Circle facilitators will receive a \$1000 stipend per facilitator for organizing their circle. Each circle will also be allocated \$500 to support activities related to their work. PAUSE: An Opportunity for Sophomores to "PAUSE" at the Campion Renewal Center in Weston

Last year, Merrimack College received a \$47,290 NetVUE Program Development Grant from the Council of Independent Colleges and the Lily Foundation to support programming designed to foster a sense of vocational awareness in our students. The grant calls for a collaborative effort among faculty and professionals from Student Affairs and Mission and Ministry to develop this programming over the next two years.

To provide some background on the foundation work already conducted, since last February informational sessions were offered in which people from across campus worked to develop an experience geared toward sophomores. As a result of these discussions, Merrimack College will inaugurate the program **PAUSE**, an opportunity for sophomores to "pause" for 3 days at

Campion Renewal Center in Weston, Massachusetts. This type of student formation program has had incredible success at Boston College and many other faith-based institutions throughout the nation.

Our hope is that it will have similar success here at Merrimack. **PAUSE**, to be held January 18-20, 2018, will invite students to step back from their busy lives to think about how their major, course of study and future career fit in with who they really are. We are planning for this to be an opportunity for sophomores to have real conversations with students, faculty and staff about finding and pursuing passions...and yes, to "pause." One significant component of **PAUSE** is to have faculty and staff share their own personal reflection in dialogic panels (a nod to our Augustinian heritage). In these panels, faculty and staff will be invited to share on one of the following sets of questions:

- What do you know of yourself? Why are these things important?
- Who has been important to you and why? Who has carried you? Whom have you carried?
- How have you turned your unique talent into a gift for others and the world? How wide are your circles of service and care for others?

We are also asking for you to nominate students - kindly send nominations to **pause@merrimack.edu**. We'd appreciate registrations and nominations to be submitted by **November 15**.
