The CETL Awards Two Faculty Fellowships

Dr. Sadegh Asgari, Assistant Professor, Civil Engineering and Dr. Brandy Benedict,

Associate Professor, Mathematics have been awarded Faculty Fellowships in the Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning. Dr. Asgari's project, "Engineering Education through Innovative Computer-Mediated Learning Technologies" centers on exploring the pedagogical benefits and limitations of using technologies, specifically Building Information Models (BIM), to deliver course materials in a more interactive, collaborative, and experiential manner.

Advancing teaching and learning in a fully electronic classroom, Dr. Benedict's research project, "Beyond Paper and Pencil: Electronic Assessments for iPad Use," aims to design and implement electronic testing to ensure accessibility and provide multiple types of electronic assessment in order benefit more students.

Faculty Fellows are central to the CETL's mission to engage faculty in developing innovative and research-based pedagogies that enhance student learning and support academic success. Please join the Office of the Provost and the CETL in congratulating Dr. Asgari and Dr. Benedict on their award.

Academic Calendar Reminder: Presidents' Day Federal Holiday

The Calendar Advisory Committee, together with the Office of the Provost, would like to remind all faculty about a difference in the current academic calendar from those in prior years: **there is now a single, unified academic calendar for all undergraduate and graduate programs.**

Specifically, for Spring 2018, this means that all programs (undergraduate and graduate) will follow a Monday class schedule on Tuesday, February 20. As in Fall 2017, this calendar will also include a two-day weekday reading period as part of the instructional semester to serve as a bridge between the end of classes and the start of exams.

Due to the observance of holidays (often on Mondays), adjustments are necessary in order to ensure an even distribution of class weekdays (M-T-W-R-F) throughout the semester. If these adjustments are not performed, classes meeting on certain weekdays would have an insufficient number of meetings throughout the semester, potentially leading to issues with federal credit-hour and accreditation (NEASC) requirements. Typically, these adjustments are performed by substituting Merrimack's Monday class schedule on a Tuesday (usually Columbus Day in the fall and Presidents' Day in the spring).

Faculty teaching Monday courses in the spring are encouraged to clearly note in their syllabi that due to the *Presidents' Day Federal Holiday* class will be held on Tuesday, February 20, on a Monday schedule and at their discretion may be flexible regarding attendance for those with unavoidable conflicts due to the switch in class dates for that week.

Winter Session:

DECEMBER 5 - Course shells were created and are available for editing. Contact Janet Syed (syedj@merrimack.edu) for assistance with setting up your course.

DECEMBER 19 - Student enrollments will begin feeding to Blackboard course shells.

Spring Semester:

DECEMBER 18TH - Full semester (R3) courses and courses that run in the first half of the semester (R1) will be created and made available for editing. We are rolling these out a week earlier than usual to give faculty the opportunity to begin working on them before leaving for break. JANUARY 8 - Student Enrollments will begin feeding to R1 and R3 Blackboard course shells.

FEBRUARY 19 - Courses that run the second half of the spring semester (R2) will be created.

MARCH 4 - Student enrollments will begin feeding to R2 Blackboard course shells.

Mturk Workshop

The Psychology Department invites you to attend a workshop on the process of collecting data through mturk. You can learn more about mturk here: https://www.mturk.com/mturk/welcome Mturk can be combined with Qualtrics (to which the College already subscribes) to collect data from a diverse pool of participants (both nationally and internationally). Adam Berinsky will conduct this workshop and cover the following topics:

- 1. The logistics of setting up data collection with Mturk
- 2. Who the participants are in these studies and how they are reimbursed
- 3. The ethics of using Mturk to collect data

- 4. Best practices in survey design and collection
- 5. Collecting panel data
- 6. Running experiments with incentives

Workshop participants will leave with an understanding of how to set up mturk data collection in an ethical manner as well as an understanding of the pros and cons to this way of collecting data. Members of Merrimack's IRB will also be in attendance.
