Beginning in September 2018, we will no longer accept NIH training certification for any research requiring IRB review.

Why the transition to CITI? CITI training is a nationally recognized human subjects research and compliance training program. CITI provides a comprehensive and holistic training certification that is more widely recognized and accepted than our previous NIH training.
