

Congratulations to Associate Professor of Civil Engineering Dr. Marc Veletzos, who recently began his work as a Fulbright Senior Scholar in Nepal. Dr. Veletzos and his colleagues at Kathmandu University are working on a variety of earthquake engineering research projects that will improve the research capabilities of Nepal and help the Nepali people develop culturally relevant earthquake-resistant building designs. Dr. Veletzos will return to Nepal next summer to continue these projects. Donna Harrington-Lueker's *Books for Idle Hours: Nineteenth-Century Publishing and the Rise of Summer Reading* draws upon letters, diaries, archival materials, and an array of nineteenth-century popular novels set at summer resorts, to show how the practice of light summer reading (AKA the "beach read") takes shape in the nineteenth century. In addition to this book, her academic work has appeared in the *Keats-Shelley Journal, Journalism History*, and *Nineteenth Century Studies.* The campus visit is a homecoming for Harrington-Lueker who graduated from Merrimack College in 1976 with a major in English.

## Yousef Bashir

Yousef Bashir will read from and talk about his book, *The Words of My Father: Love and Pain in Palestine*. The book chronicles a childhood under Israeli occupation in Gaza. When he was 11 years old, his family home was taken over by the Israeli Army; when he was 15 years old, Bashir was shot in the back by an Israeli soldier. Since then, he has dedicated his life to peace.

In an opinion piece in The New York Times, Bashir writes:"The Israeli army apologized to me, and the soldier who shot me was suspended. I often wonder what has happened to him since, why he did it and what he now thinks about the whole thing. I wish we could talk. I would tell him that I want to do my part to make peace between our peoples more possible, the way my father taught me. I would tell him that I have forgiven him."
