Changes to NSF Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide (PAPPG)

NSF has issued the revised PAPPG which will be effective June 1, 2020. A webinar is available that provides the "Significant Changes & Clarifications". Changes include Biographical Sketch, Current & Pending Support, SciENcv, Budget and Budget Justification and training requirements for Responsible & Ethical Conduct of Research, Non-Discrimination Statutes and Regulations and Reporting Possible Misconduct. New NIH requirements

ORCID iDs (Open Research and Contributor Identifiers) are now required when applying for NIH grants effective October 1, 2020. ORCID iDs are digital identifiers that distinguish individual investigators and can be used to connect researchers with their contributions to science over time and across changes of name, location and institution affiliation.
