## Greetings

I recently had the pleasure of attending a presentation from this year's Zampell Family Faculty Fellows. Zampell faculty fellowships are funded by Christine '75 and James Zampell '75, and I want to thank them for their continued generosity and support for engaged faculty research and scholarship. On Friday, Oct. 8, I witnessed 17 faculty engaged in six different projects. They described their research findings, the impact their research had in their respective fields and how their research has and will shape their approach in the classroom. I was impressed by the creativity, the collaboration and the commitment each of them had to their disciplines, their students and to the broader community.

Criminology and Criminal Justice faculty
Dr. Alicia Girgenti-Malone and Dr.
Alyssa Yetter unveiled their work
developing an assessment of the
College's groundbreaking program
combining their master's degree with the
College's nascent Police Academy. Civil
Engineer Dr. Sadegh Asgari related his
interdisciplinary research study that
incorporates concepts and techniques
from mathematical modeling, game
theory, and finance to help develop more
efficient and accurate planning for
construction projects.

Finally, Dr. Zi Yan, Dr. Sarah Benes, Dr. Eleanor Shonkoff, Dr. Luis Saenz de Viguera Erkiaga and Dr. Seungbin Oh –

**Kurdziel** – both members of Merrimack's Psychology department - described their longitudinal study exploring the relationship between mild traumatic brain injury, emotional regulation and sleep. Communication and Media faculty Dr. Melissa Zimdars, Dr. Kilhoe Na and Dr. Megan Cullinan discussed their efforts to explore and track how health misinformation, rumors and conspiracies spread on Facebook. Chemistry Department faculty Dr. Anthony Fernandez and Dr. Joseph Chiarelli explained how they are leveraging mobile technology to improve student engagement in computational Chemistry.

Liberal Arts – reviewed their work building a community-based health coaching program that supports student learning, research and community service.

I am proud of the Zampell faculty's work, and I look forward to announcing in a few weeks the calls for a variety of faculty research support that will be accepting applications this winter. Building our research capacity – including the support that will allow faculty to apply for external grants – is a key component of the College's Agenda for the Future.

## Three-Year Degree Project

Merrimack College was recently nominated by New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) President Larry Schall and invited to participate in a national project to conceptualize and pilot a three-year baccalaureate degree with the goal of reducing costs to students while improving student outcomes and experiences.

The innovative and progressive project led by Robert Zemsky (University of Pennsylvania) and Lori Carrell (University of Minnesota-Rochester) seeks to rethink the standard four-year bachelor's degree. The project seeks to reshape accreditation and federal financial aid policy that has been limiting to student affordability, access and progression towards a degree.

The project involves more than a dozen colleges across the United States, and Merrimack

more affordable, while also creating new pathways that provide both access and opportunity to disadvantaged groups of students as outlined in our <u>Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) goals</u>.

We are currently exploring what such a degree could look like in terms of content, structure, cost and student experience at Merrimack. That work is being done by a working group formed earlier this semester consisting of faculty and senior administrators.

The group includes: John "Sean" Condon, Susan Marine, Mark Allman, Jeff Doggett, Simona Sharoni, Jonathan Lyon, Karen Ryan, Dan Butin-Sarofian, Rickey Caldwell, Emma Duffy-Comparone, Laura Kurdziel, Kate Kurkul, Ellen McWhorter, Raymond Shaw, Ana Silva, Doug White and Zi Yan.

Once the working group explores a potential model and develops a pilot proposal, their findings will be shared with the broader campus community of faculty and staff for feedback on next steps. ## Cybersecurity Awareness Month

Cybersecurity issues are on the rise across the world, and October is National Cybersecurity Awareness Month. Cybersecurity is everyone's responsibility regardless of your job/role on campus. - Check links before you click: On most browsers you can do this by hovering over the link with your mouse cursor.

Midterm grades are an important way to help students gauge their performance in their classes, and allows the College to identify and follow-up with students who may be struggling and need extra support.

Essential first aid training for anyone age 18 and older who wants to learn how to help a person who may be experiencing a mental health related crisis or problem. This course teaches you to recognize signs and symptoms and provides the steps to take to provide help. Participants will come away with the skills and tools to offer help to others and increase their personal knowledge.

#### What you will learn in this eight-hour course:

- The impact of mental illness in the U.S.
- Risk factors and warning signs for depression, anxiety, trauma, substance use and psychosis
- · A five-step action plan to help an individual in crisis connects to professional help
- Local community resources available to offer support

Participants will receive an informational workbook that summarizes the training as well as a list of community resources.


